Early Childhood Education Subcommittee



- Part of Governor's Education Reform Commission (ERC)
- Governor's charge to subcommittee:
 - Study and make recommendations for the expansion of early educational options, including expanding Pre-K in Georgia and increasing access to quality-rated programs for all kids, from birth to age five. This will require addressing our current funding formula for Georgia Pre-K as well as considering innovative approaches for getting more children in high quality programs
 - Recommendations must be made by August 1, 2015 so that a new Pre-K formula can be a part of my FY2017 budget proposal as well.

Early Childhood Education Subcommittee



- (continued)
- Composed of 21 members (5 from ERC; 16 invited reps from private providers, school systems, advocacy organizations, other state agencies
- Meeting seven times between February-July
- Have completed preliminary recommendations related to Pre-K funding (lead teacher and assistant teacher salaries; class size; miscellaneous Pre-K policy guidelines)
- Will begin working on increasing access to Quality Rated at next meeting

FY15 Pre-K Special Allotment Funding



- Class Level Funding
 - Technology Allotment
 - 105 classes
 - \$1,500 for new classrooms funded during the FY15 year
 - 8-Year Refurbishment Allotment
 - 170 classes
 - \$4,000/classroom
 - Special Allotment
 - 3,828 classes
 - \$2,000/classroom
 - Curriculum, Playground, Technology



SFY 2016 Budget Highlights



- \$5,443,865 of additional lottery funds for Pre-K formula funding
 - \$3,036,817 to restore two Pre-K planning days for a total of 10 days
 - \$2,130,481 to provide a 1% salary increase for Pre-K teachers and assistant teachers
 - \$276,568 to provide for changes to the Teachers Retirement System benefit rate
- \$1,440,000 of additional lottery funds for 60 additional Summer Transition Program classes

Under the Gold Dome: Highlights from the 2015 Georgia General Assembly





House Bill 401 – DECAL Legislation Passes

- Allows DECAL to make administrative and other improvements to enhance the department's operations. It will streamline the process by which independent contractors, substitute teachers, temporary employees, or technical college and university students majoring in early childhood education are screened.
- House Vote: 170-4 on March 13, 2015
- Senate Vote: 52-1 on April 2, 2015
- Sent to Governor: April 8, 2015
- Signed by Governor: May 6, 2015

Highlights from the 2015 Georgia General Assembly (continued)



Bills of interest to DECAL that passed

- SR 491: Recognizes October 5-9, 2015 as Georgia Pre-K Week
- SB 138: Addresses many of the recommendations of the Governor's Child Welfare Reform Council, including the creation of a child abuse registry

Bills of interest to DECAL that did not pass

- HB 100: Allow children who are five years old by August 1 to enroll in kindergarten
- SB 34: Removes liability for damages or injuries when a person breaks into a parked car to rescue an endangered person

Other bills of interest that passed

- SB 133 & SR 287: Helps failing schools by creating the Opportunity School District
- SB 1: Requires individual insurance provider to cover autism for children age six and under
- HB 1: Use of medical cannabis oil for eight medical conditions
- HB 170: A \$1 billion transportation funding plan

 - Longitudinal Data is aggregated and compared over a period of time



Summer Transition Program



Targeted six-week school readiness program for income eligible children

- Rising Kindergarten Program
 - Focused on children who did not attend Georgia's Pre-K or attended Georgia's Pre-K or Head Start but need additional support who will attend Kindergarten in the fall
 - Class size: 16 students
 - 80 classes, 1,280 slots
- Rising Pre-K Program
 - Focused on children whose home language is Spanish and who will attend Pre-K in the fall
 - Class size: 14 students
 - 30 classes, 420 slots

STP Evaluation: Demographics



- Rising Kindergarten (RK) Program
 - Offered in 62 classrooms across 24 counties
 - Served over 1,000 children
- Rising Pre-K (RPre-K) Program
 - Tailored to meet the needs of families and children who speak Spanish at home
 - Offered in 20 classrooms across 10 counties
 - Served approximately 275 children
- The overall goal of the RK and the RPre-K summer programs is to support children's transitions and development, particularly their early literacy skills, through the last few months before entering Kindergarten or pre-kindergarten.




STP Evaluation Design

- Assessed teacher child interactions (CLASS)
- Measured teachers' use of Spanish and English in the Rising Pre-K classrooms
- Surveyed teachers, transition coaches, and families

Teacher Child Interactions



- In both programs, scores for CLASS Emotional Support and Classroom Organization were high.
- Instructional Support was typically in the middle range in the RK program and the low range in RPre-K program.



Use of English and Spanish



- Spanish and English were used regularly in RPre-K classrooms.
- English was the predominant language in the average RPre-K classroom, but Spanish was also used for instruction and behavior management by the lead and assistant teachers.
- Whole group reading activities took place in the majority of classrooms, with approximately half using some or all Spanish.
- Ideally, all classrooms should have books and labeled objects in English and Spanish. A few classrooms (14%) had no Spanish books, and two-thirds of them had no objects labeled in Spanish.

Comments about the STP



- "This program was invented for my child, so that she will be ready for kindergarten."
- "It really encouraged my daughter to enjoy school and learning."
- "My daughter comes home very excited to show me what she learned at school. She speaks more English. She loves when I read her books."*
- "I liked it a lot because my daughter has learned to get along with other children and the truth is it has helped in her development of learning."*

Overview



- The Kindergarten Entry Profile (KEP) is one component of Georgia's Early Learning Challenge initiative.
- The KEP will:
 - augment the Georgia Kindergarten Inventory of Developing Skills (GKIDS) and be administered during the first six weeks of Kindergarten;
 - be aligned to the Georgia Early Learning Development Standards (GELDS); and
 - be built to be developmentally appropriate, reflecting research-based best practices for young learners.

Purpose




- The purpose of the KEP will be to highlight knowledge and skills critical for student success in learning, solely to guide instruction. It will:
 - provide information to allow Kindergarten teachers to individualize instruction;
 - inform our understanding of the skills of children entering Kindergarten; and
 - provide the early childhood system with information about the supports and resources needed to ensure that every Kindergarten student starts school with the skills needed to be successful.

Development Process



- Identification of Essential Skills and Concepts
 - GaDOE convened a committee of educators to help identify the essential skills and concepts to be assessed
 - Based on the essential skills and concepts identified by the committee, a survey was sent to Pre-K and Kindergarten teachers statewide to assess the level of agreement with the standards to be assessed on the KEP.
 - Survey results were used to make any necessary adjustments prior to developing the blueprint for the KEP.

Development Process



- KEP Development Committee
 - Composed of Pre-K, Kindergarten, and 1st Grade teachers, an early childhood expert, and representatives from DECAL and GaDOE
- Blueprint Development
 - Based on the essential skills and concepts identified, the KEP Development Committee proposed a blueprint for the KEP, including the number and type of items to assess each standard.
- Task Development
 - Tasks and observational protocols were developed to assess the identified standards.
 - The KEP Development Committee met in March to review tasks and protocols.



Development Process



- Pre-K Pilot
 - April 20 May 8
 - Each activity was piloted with at least 250 students across 60 public and private Pre-K classrooms
 - Student performance levels and qualitative data collected via an online survey
 - Review of data by educator committee: June 9

Development Process



- Kindergarten Field Test
 - Fall 2015
 - Sample includes 25 Kindergarten classrooms selected to be representative of the state's demographics
 - Administered during the first six weeks of the Kindergarten year to all students in each selected classroom
 - Data collected will include student performance levels as well as qualitative feedback from teachers

Next Steps



- Timeline
 - Pre-K field test—Spring 2016
 - Operational launch (sample) Fall 2016
 - Statewide launch Fall 2017
- Additional work throughout the term of the project will include the development of online training modules and performance reports.
