Dear DECAL Co-workers,

Before Governor Deal appointed me Commissioner, I had a high-level perspective of what DECAL did because of my responsibilities at the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget (OPB). But it wasn't until I came to work here that I began to understand fully the breadth and depth of what we do every day. I've learned a lot the past 4½ years and am constantly amazed at all the ways we serve hundreds of thousands of children and families across our state day-in-and-day-out.

One area of our work I was not so familiar with when I worked at OPB is being celebrated later this month. February 11-15, 2019 has been designated Inclusive Early Learning Week...during which we will partner with child care providers to celebrate, inform, and reflect on serving children with disabilities and without disabilities to ensure that all Georgia's children benefit from high quality learning experiences.

Before joining DECAL, I hadn't really thought much about INCLUSION...what it means and why it is so important. I hadn't consciously considered how ALL children in Georgia should receive the same high quality early care and education...in the same classrooms if possible. I hadn't thought about the fact that ALL children, those who develop typically and those with disabilities, benefit when included in the same classroom.

My understanding of and appreciation for inclusion has changed dramatically, and I'm proud of the

Civic Dinners Focused on Literacy Held in DECAL's Six Regions

In partnership with the Sandra Dunagan Deal Center for Early Language and Literacy, DECAL's six Early Education Community Partnership Coordinators hosted an event called *Civic Dinner: Literacy Changes Lives* in each of their respective regions. The mission of the Civic Dinners is to bring communities together around a meal to talk about the importance of literacy and the impact it has on the state's youngest learners and families. Each dinner, during which community stakeholders engaged in meaningful conversations around the topic of literacy, was a resounding success.

The civic dinner held in Savannah at Cohen's Retreat included attendees from the library system, Georgia Family Connection Partnership, and DECAL. Attendees of the South East Region dinner shared stories about the types of literature they enjoyed as children and about the people who inspired and encouraged him/her to read because it was an important part of their education.

In Social Circle, participants enjoyed dinner at the Blue Willow Inn. They shared memories of incentive programs in schools, such as the Book It program, and how those programs helped children find a passion for reading and literacy. The Central East Region's Community Partnership Coordinator Audrienne Smith said, "Hosting this civic dinner confirmed that literacy really does change lives."

Glenda Davis-Canteen, community partnership coordinator of the North West Region, described her dinner as "a night filled with stimulating conversation, laughter, and passion, sharing childhood memories from decades ago about how reading impacted the early education and literacy of all our lives."

At the Olive Tree Restaurant in Lithia Springs, Central West Region Community Partnership Coordinator Bridgette Washington was excited about her literacy dinner. "When I learned that I would be hosting a civic dinner, I looked forward to supporting First Lady Sandra Deal's mission," Washington said. Georgia Awarded \$2.9M Preschool Development Grant

Georgia has been awarded a \$2.9 million Preschool Development Grant B - 5 by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the U.S. Department of Education. The funds will be used to help ensure that Georgia's children from birth to age five have access to high quality early childhood care and education (ECCE).

DECAL will serve as the lead state agency in executing the activities funded by the grant. While ultimately benefiting all children and families in the state, these activities will focus on the needs of children and families from vulnerable and underserved populations.

Using grant funds, DECAL will conduct a statewide ECCE needs assessment; develop a statewide strategic plan to strengthen Georgia's ECCE system; create resources to inform families about available programs and services; and develop groups and opportunities for early childhood educators to share best practices.

The initial grant award covers one year. Later this year, the states that received initial grants will be eligible to compete for additional funding of up to \$45 million over three years

Governor Asks Commissioner to Continue to Lead DECAL

Commissioner Amy M. Jacobs will continue to lead DECAL under the administration of Governor Brian P. Kemp, who officially assumed office on January 14.

"I feel honored and humbled that Governor Kemp has asked me to remain in my position as Commissioner of DECAL," said Jacobs. "I look forward to working with him and his staff to further the work we've been doing to enhance the affordability, accessibility, and quality of early childhood care and education."

Jacobs, who was first appointed Interim Commissioner of DECAL in June 2014, said she also looks forward to and is grateful for the opportunity to continue working with her fellow DECALers.

"Because of you and your commitment to children, families, providers, sponsors, stakeholders, children's advocacy, etc., this department has set a gold standard for customer service, professionalism, and civil service," she said in a message to the staff.

"Thank you for who you are and what you do. By maintaining our work with each other...and with Governor Kemp, his staff, and the

leaders from the faith-based community. Stories flowed from the participants about experiences in school, how parents encouraged reading, and ways to motivate children to read.

Edward Rowell, Community Partnership Coordinator of the South West Region, said that the highlight of the dinner conversation centered around how some individuals grew up in areas where they did not have access to books and libraries and how this affected them individually. Now as adults, the participants love to read and model reading to their own children.

In the North East Region, Lead Community Partnership Coordinator Clayton Adams hosted a civic dinner in December where eight community partners sat around a table and talked about the earliest memories of reading books with their grandparents and the importance of the libraries in their local communities.

Foundation Awards Grants to Georgia Child Care Programs Impacted by Hurricane Michael

Over the past few months, the Georgia Foundation for Early Care + Learning administered 42 special mini-grants to licensed child care programs in Southwest Georgia impacted by Hurricane Michael, including the one pictured below. The funding was procured through the international organization Save the Children.

The mini-grants, totaling \$25,000, helped to support over 1,343 children and approximately 220 teachers across 20 Georgia counties approved by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for individual assistance.
