Definitions

Statistical Terms

Medians and Percentiles

The median is the rate at which one-half of the respondents charge *that rate* or *less*; and the other half charges *that rate or more*. For example, if the respondents were ranked in descending order based on their value on the rate under examination, the median would be the rate at which the respondents are evenly divided into two groups. The median of \$50, \$60, \$70, \$75, and \$85 is \$70.

The median is also known as the *50th percentile*. Medians are less prone to being biased by extreme values. In the example above, if the highest value had been \$145 instead of \$85, the median would still be \$70. Means, on the other hand, can be affected more by extreme scores.

Similarly, any specific percentile (e.g., 75th percentile) is the rate at which that percent of providers (e.g., 75%) charge that rate or less; and the remaining providers (e.g., 25%) charge that rate or more.

Mean

The mean is simply the arithmetic average. In the above example, the mean is \$68. However, if the highest score had been \$145 instead of \$85, the mean would be \$80.

Standard Error

The standard error of the mean is a measure of dispersion of sample means around the population mean. The smaller the standard error, the more closely the sample mean estimates the true population mean.

Standard Deviation

The standard deviation is a measure of dispersion of the distribution of rates around the mean score. The smaller the standard deviation, the more closely bunched the distribution of rates is around the mean.

Count/number of responses

The count is the number of respondents from whom valid data was received. When examining a particular statistic, such as the mean or median, it is often important to know the count (or "number of cases") upon which the statistic is based. Statistics based on a small number of cases are often unstable and unreliable.

Georgia Categories of Child Care Providers

Licensed Child Care Learning Center "Child Care Learning Center" or "Center" means any place operated by an individual or any business entity recognized under Georgia law wherein are received for pay for group care, for less than 24 hours per day without transfer of legal custody, seven or more children under 18 years of age and which is required to be licensed.¹

Licensed Family Child Care Learning Home

"Family Child Care Learning Home" or "Home" means a private residence operated by any person who receives therein for pay for supervision and care for less than 24 hours per day, without transfer of legal custody, at least three but not more than six children under 13 years of age who are not related to such persons and whose parent(s) are not residents in the same private residence as the provider and which is required to be licensed; provided, however, that the total number of unrelated children cared for in such home, for pay and not for pay, may not exceed six children under 13 years of age at one time, except that a provider may care for two additional children three years of age or older for two designated one-hour periods daily upon approval by the state.

Whenever related children or children who reside in the home are present in the home, the total number of children present under the age of 13 may not exceed 12.²

License-Exempt Programs

Certain programs providing care for children may apply for a licensing exemption. These include government owned and operated programs; private schools for children ages 5 and up; private pre-k programs; short-term babysitting, e.g, mother's morning out or onsite babysitting; day camp programs for children ages 5 and up; out-of-school-time single-purpose instructional programs (e.g., music, dance, sports); programs providing care for children for no pay, including Head Start and Early Head Start; centers that are part of an established religious congregation or school.³

Types of Child Care

Weekday Care	Care and supervision of children Monday through Friday, typically between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.
Weeknight Care	Care and supervision of children during the evening or night for a period of six to 12 hours between 6:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
Part-time Care	Includes drop-in and/or weekend care; weekday/weeknight care less than three days a week.
Before-and After- School Care	Care for school-age children several hours before and/or after school.
Summer Care	Care for school-age children during the summer.



Slot-Based Market Rate Percentiles

With the CCDF reauthorization of 2014 and subsequent promulgation of rules by the federal Administration for Children and Families (ACF), additional requirements and guidance for understandingthe price and/or cost of child care were established. Specific to market rate surveys, one of the requirements is to analyze data in a manner that captures market differences. "The survey should examinethe price per child care slot, recognizing that all child care facilities should not be weighted equally because some serve more children than others." In other words, the guidance is suggesting that market rate statistics be weighted so that the rates charged by providers serving more children count more because they account for more spaces, or slots, in the child care market.

In response to this new federal guidance, analysis of the Georgia 2016-2017 survey results included a comparison of site- and slot-based market rate statistics for the first time. This appendix includes slot-based rate statistics for the 2021 survey results.

As in the previous survey (2016-2017), one of the challenges in analyzing slot-based rates was determining how to weight the rates. State administrative data included capacity for licensed centers and for licensed family homes. However, unlike rate information, capacity information was not divided by child age group. The alternative was to use reported child enrollment by age group. Reported enrollment data also presented some challenges:

- Missing enrollment data.
- Enrollments of zero for a particular age group: Providers may have reported rates for an age group in which they had no enrollment – most likely affecting family providers, who, for example, may provide care for a two-year-old but did not have a two-year-old enrolled at the time of the survey. (The number of licensed centers providing rates but missing enrollments was fairly small.)
- Some inaccurate enrollment data for ages 5-12 (school-age children): As in the 2016-2017 survey, it was apparent that some private or faith-based schools listed their full K-5 or K-8 rather than just the number enrolled in before-and/or after school care programs.
- Some enrollment data for licensed family homes suggested more slots than licensing wouldallow. These providers may have different children on different days or different children atdifferent times of day, in effect sharing slots.
- For providers with reduced capacity due to the COVID-19 pandemic, enrollments may not reflect the number of slots available in normal operations.

Slot-based rate statistics were weighted based on reported age-group enrollment, with the following exceptions:

- Licensed family child care home slots were capped at six, because that is the
 maximum number of unrelated children that can be in that type of care. Reported
 enrollment was scaled sothat age group weights summed to six. For example, if a
 family provider reported a total enrollment of eight and an enrollment of one fouryear-old, the four-year-old rate would be multiplied by 0.75 (the number in that age
 group divided by the total number enrolled multipliedby six).
- 2. Slot-based rate statistics exclude rates for providers who provided a rate for a specific age group and type of care but did not report enrollment or reported zero enrollment for that age group.

Site-based rate statistics are based on unweighted data. The comparison of 2021 site-based and slot-based rate percentiles showed that, most of the slot-based rates were higher than the site-based rates for licensed centers and exempt programs at the 50th and 75th percentiles.

- For licensed child care centers, weekday care slot-based rates were higher for each age group and at each quartile. For example, the 75th percentile rates for three-year-old care were \$180 and \$210 for site- and slot- based rates, respectively, indicating there were more slots at more expensive centers.
- For license-exempt programs, weekday care slot-based rates were higher for each age group at the 50th and 75th percentiles, except for five-year-olds.
- Slot and site-based rates were generally comparable for licensed family child care learning homes, with some inconsistencies in which was higher or lower.

The following table presents a comparison of site and slot-based rates. Slot-based responses are the number of providers reporting both rate and enrollment for the specified age group.





Georgia Child Care Market Rate Survey Verification

Verification Method

Verifications were conducted using a mystery shopper technique, with targeted call scripts created for calling licensed centers and exempt programs and for calling family child care homes. Individuals making the calls were provided cell phones for this purpose and received role-play training prior to making calls. They posed as parents in need of child care for a two-year-old, four-year-old, and nine-year-old and asked providers questions about the care they provide and what they charge for that care.

A 15% random sample of provider respondents was pulled at the end of the market rate survey period: 49% licensed centers, 25% exempt providers, and 26% family child care homes.

Up to three attempts were made to contact each provider in the sample, typically spread across different days and times. As in previous market rate survey verification efforts, some providers could not be reached or refused to provide information over the telephone, with some indicating prices would be provided at the time of a visit.

Interviewers each worked from a spreadsheet with a set of provider survey IDs, logged call attempts and/or callback information, and recorded provider responses. These spreadsheets were compiled and data cleaned as needed based on interviewer notes. Verification rates reported as daily, monthly, semester or annual were converted to weekly and then compared to the weekly rates reported on the child care market rate survey.

Verification Call Results

A total of 964 call attempts were documented among the sample of 432 providers, and 303 provider contacts (70%) were completed. The number of unsuccessful attempts was likely due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on provider operations, including not only temporary and permanent closures but also reduced staffing/capacity as well as survey fatigue due to number of provider surveys conducted during market rate survey period.

A few programs reported being closed or not providing childcare or as single-purpose programs or programs not considered part of the priced child care market (e.g., onsite babysitting).

Verification Rate Results

Overall, verification results showed that providers generally reported the same or nearly the same rates on the survey and the verification calls. Because of the mystery shopper call technique, it is not surprising that rates reported on the survey and rates reported to callers might differ to some degree for the following reasons:

- While the survey was administered primarily in the months of March-July 2021, the verification calls were completed in late August and early September, and providers may have been citing changing rates for the upcoming session or year.
- Providers may cite discounted rates to a parent expressing a direct interest or early interest in care for an upcoming session or year.

While there were discrepancies between rates reported on the survey and those provided on verification calls, the state may have confidence in the survey rates for the following reasons:

• For most of the rate comparisons above, the provider rate falls within \$10 of the rates reported on survey forms.

- Previous child care market rate survey rate verifications have shown that provider rates typically fall within \$10 of the rates reported on survey forms
- Percentiles are used for reporting and comparing rate data based on survey responses
