Requests for Teacher Credential Waivers

- Beginning in March, you will be able to submit waiver requests in PANDA.
 - Once the form is available in PANDA, the paper form will no longer be accepted.
- Requests for an extension of a current approved waiver should be submitted in PANDA once the new process is available.

CDA with CLASS Program



- DECAL, in partnership with Teachstone, is offering the CDA CLASS Facilitated program at no cost to participants.
 - Program is available for Georgia's Pre-K lead teachers and assistant teachers who are approved for a waiver in the 2022-2023 school year.
- CDA with CLASS provides teachers with guidance and support to complete their required coursework and portfolio requirements, while learning ways to improve teacher-student interactions.
- Once participants finish the Teachstone training, they will be able to apply for DECAL Scholars to cover the observation/assessment fee. The CDA is completely free for those that meet the DECAL Scholars eligibility criteria.

Pre-K Program

State Lottery Funds Change			
FY 2023	FY 2024	Increase	% Change
\$400,900,881	\$435,610,158	\$34,709,277	8.66%

Proposed

- Increase formula funds for classroom operations and redirect existing funding to Pre-K lead teacher salaries=\$14,035,636
- Increase funds to adjust the state base salary schedule to increase salaries for certified Pre-K teachers and assistant teachers by \$2,000 = \$20,647,514
- Reduce formula funds for training and experience for Pre-K teachers=\$(178,981)
- Increase funds to provide a \$2,000 cost-of-living adjustment for all full-time, benefit-eligible state employees effective July 1, 2023, to address agency recruitment and retention needs = \$202,326

Governor's Recommendation FY 2024



Potential Budget Impact

Teachers:

- ALL Teachers: Increase in base salary of \$2,000 for lead and assistant teachers
- Lead Teachers: Require 100% of base salary to be paid for lead teacher position


Operating Funds:

- Classroom: Increase of \$3676.16 per class
- Benefits: Increase due to the additional \$2,000 in salary; amount varies based on program type and credential level
 - Public School Certified Lead
 - 39.96% X 2,000= **\$799.20**
 - All other credential levels for Leads and Assistants (public and private)
 - 23.76% X 2,000= **\$475.20**






- Current Enrollment: 73,462
 - Estimated 54% of 4-year-olds.
 - 38% (60) counties serve 70% or more of their 4-year-olds
 - 18% (29) of counties serve less than 50% of their
 4- year-olds
- Current Waiting List: 2,718
 - Counties with the highest waiting list: Fulton (378), Henry (178), Gwinnett (116), Fayette (115), Bibb (101), and Carroll (107)





Slight Increase in Pre-K Enrollment for SY2023



% of Four-Year-Old Population Served:

SY2019:	60%
SY2020:	60%
SY2021:	46%
SY2022:	53%
SY2023:	54%



Why is Enrollment Decreasing?

- Following national and state trends for enrollment
 - Birth rate: 16% fewer births in 2018 than Georgia's peak in 2007
 - Kindergarten enrollment down 2.5%
- Impact of the pandemic
 - Family choices for preschool children
 - Family mobility
 - Population shifts within the state



Why is There Still a Waiting List with Low Enrollment?

- Open slots are not aligned with waiting list demand
- No capacity in areas of need
- Parent choice/need
 - Program type
 - Location
 - Transportation
 - Before and after care





Class Size Impact

- Classes with significantly lower class size over multiple years
- Need to close classes with lower enrollment to stabilize enrollment in communities
- Due to the low enrollment in Pre-K, we will be able to pilot reducing class size to 20 students.
 - Next school year, we will be able to serve the current number of students AND any projected increase of students.



Class Closures

- Considerations for closure:
 - Low enrollment over multiple years
 - Uncredentialed / Instability in lead teachers
 - Outstanding balances due
- Programs will be notified prior to submitting their application.
 - Notification of class closure
 - Notification of monitoring class enrollment and potential closure
- Grant agreements will include any changes in the number of classrooms awarded.

Class Size Reduction Pilot

- In 2011, Georgia's Pre-K class size was increased from 20 to 22 as part of the HOPE budget reforms.
 - The current class size of 22 students is above the recommended Pre-K class size of 18-20 students.
 - Reducing class size is the 2nd highest priority for Pre-K teachers and providers (after salary).
 - The reduction of class size will allow teachers to provide more individualized instruction.
- Programs can serve up to 22 students based on student registration and need in the area.
 - Funding will be the same for 20 22 students.
 - Roster data will determine if a per child proration under 20 students will be applied.
 - August and September payments will be based on full enrollment (20-22 students).
 - Based on implementation of pilot, programs should anticipate a class size of 20 for the following school year (SY2024 2025).

Determining Class Size

- It is a program decision next school year.
- You should make the best decision for your program and your families.
- For example:
 - If your current registration is 20 or less, then you should plan to enroll up to 20 students.
 - If you have one class with 22 students enrolled for next year, you should plan to serve all students. Your class size could reduce to 21 or 20 because of student withdrawals.
 - If you have multiple classes, you should distribute students across classrooms to stabilize class size at 20 (or close to 20).
 - If you have multiple classes, you may choose to apply for an expansion class(es) to reduce class size to 20 due to current registration numbers.
- You should only apply for an expansion if you have the number of students to support class size close to 20. Students could be registered or on a verified wait list.

Pre-K Application

- Pre-K Program Application will open on Tuesday, March 7th and close on Thursday, March 30th.
- Funding priorities:
 - Reducing class size to 20 while continuing to serve the current number of students
 - Expansion in areas with waiting list
- Programs will be able to "opt into" the pilot as part of the application process.
 - May request expansion classrooms based on reduced class size
- Decisions will be made as part of the Pre-K Grant application review process.
- The grants will be awarded in May.
